

The 5 P's of Public Speaking

Pitch

Embracing the natural variety in your voice is essential when mastering the five P's of powerful public speaking. Your voice has a range of pitches, and using this natural variation can add depth and nuance to your speech.

Avoid speaking too high or too low, as it may come across as unnatural or forced. Instead, find a comfortable middle range that suits the tone of your speech. For example, higher notes can be used for positive or uplifting content, while lower notes can emphasize more serious or impactful messages. Experiment with different pitches to create a dynamic and engaging vocal delivery. Mastering the five P's of powerful public speaking requires you to control your pitch to maintain your audience's attention and interest. *There is nothing worse than a monotone presentation. Want your audience to go to sleep? Give a one pitch presentation with a singular pace. It will be hypnotic and you will lose everyone's attention.*

Pace

Slow down and vary your speaking speed. When we're nervous, we tend to speak too quickly, which can make it difficult for the audience to keep up with our message. Mastering the five P's of powerful public speaking means knowing when to slow down and when to speed up for maximum impact. *Think of some of the "greats" like Robert F. Kennedy and the speed, halts, and inflections that he used to make his points.*

Vary your speed based on the content and tone of your speech. Sometimes, speaking a bit faster can add excitement or urgency, while speaking slower can convey thoughtfulness or emphasis. The key is to strike a balance and use pace strategically to enhance your message. By mastering the five P's of powerful public speaking, you'll learn how to pace yourself effectively, keeping your audience engaged and focused. *Pace your speech to allow your words to sink in but not so slow as to lose their attention.*

Pause

One of the most effective elements of mastering the five P's of powerful public speaking is learning how to use pauses strategically. Pausing at key points in your speech can be incredibly effective in engaging your audience. It signals to them that something important is coming, and it gives you a moment to collect your thoughts.

Don't be afraid of silence, and don't feel the need to fill every moment with words. A well-timed pause can create anticipation, emphasize a point, or allow for a brief moment to regroup. Just be mindful not to let the pause drag on for too long, as it may lose its impact. Mastering the five P's of powerful public speaking requires you to use pauses to your advantage, enhancing the impact of your message and maintaining audience engagement.

This is particularly important as long as it is not used to excess. It can be used to "keep them hanging" for your next words. It can be used to stimulate and capture their attention. Using it incorrectly can destroy a good speech.

Projection

Project energy through your voice. Good posture and proper breathing are essential for projecting your voice effectively. Mastering the five P's of powerful public speaking means learning how to use your physical presence to support your voice and ensure you are heard clearly.

Avoid slouching or restricting your airflow, as it can weaken your voice and make it difficult for your audience to hear you. Bring energy and enthusiasm to your voice, but be mindful not to shout, especially in virtual environments where microphones can amplify sounds. A well-projected voice conveys confidence and captivates your audience. By mastering the five P's of powerful public speaking, you'll be able to project your voice clearly and confidently, commanding the attention of your audience.

Push your voice out and don't be afraid to let it be heard. Enunciate clearly. If using a microphone, don't be afraid to put your lips right on the microphone and speak loudly. (If you are not used to a microphone and hearing your own words come back to you, go find a microphone, turn the amp up, and go practice until you feel comfortable with it.) Remember you are imparting something to your audience that needs to be heard by all. Keep your head up and make eye contact with your audience because you have something important to share with them. Act like you are talking with them and don't read off a piece of paper. (It is ok to refer to a list or guide but only to refer to it and not read from it.)

Passion

Let your passion shine through. When you genuinely care about your topic, it naturally comes through in your voice and delivery. Passion is a crucial aspect of mastering the five P's of powerful public speaking, as it creates an emotional connection with your audience.

Let them see and feel your passion for your subject matter. It will help you connect with your audience on a deeper level and make your speech more engaging and memorable. Your audience is more likely to stay engaged when they sense your passion, which fosters a stronger emotional connection. Mastering the five P's of powerful public speaking ensures that your passion will come through in every presentation, leaving a lasting impression on your audience.

Believing in what you're saying and imparting that makes it that much easier to deliver your speech\information. It also engages your audience, and it allows them to be swept up with you. Strive to impassion them in your delivery.

Incorporating the Five P's

It is better to speak it and discover the errors ahead of time than during delivery. (This particularly true if there are any difficult words or passages involved).

Remember, engaging public speaking is not about being perfect but about being authentic and connecting with your audience. So, embrace your unique voice, master the five P's of powerful public speaking, and let your passion shine through!
